Celebrate Valentine's Day with Hartford Symphony Orchestra!

Indulge your love of music with "Rachmaninoff & Firebird," which is being presented as part of the Hartford Symphony Orchestra's Masterworks Series February 12-15, 2015. This concert will be conducted by HSO Music Director Carolyn Kuan, and guest pianist will be Sean Chen.

Orchestral fireworks take flight from Venus to New York to Russia, including Rachmaninoff's sumptuous Second Piano Concerto and Stravinsky's romantic *Firebird*. The program also features Wagner's Overture to *Tannhäuser* and Three Dance Episodes from *On the Town* by Bernstein, which will include images from the Wadsworth Atheneum's Coney Island exhibit. This HSO collaboration with the Wadsworth Atheneum is sponsored by the Richard P. Garmany Fund at Hartford Foundation for Public Giving.

Pianist Sean Chen is being hailed as a rising star with a "million-volt smile" and a "formidable set of fingers" (*Dallas Morning News*). In 2013 Chen won the American Pianists Association's DeHaan Classical Fellowship, one of the most lucrative and significant prizes available to an American pianist. He also won Third Prize at the 14th Van Cliburn



International Piano Competition, becoming the first American to reach the finals since 1997. The 26-year-old American pianist has appeared as soloist with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra under Gerard Schwarz, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra under Leonard Slatkin and Miguel Harth-Bedoya, Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra, Corpus Christi, New West, Phoenix and San Diego Symphony Orchestras, and the Suwon City Philharmonic in South Korea.

Interview with Ruth Sovronsky, HSO's New Development Director

High Notes: What drew you to the HSO position? Do you have any exciting changes you would like to see for the HSO?

Ruth Sovronsky: When I relocated to Hartford from New York, my 'dream job" was to work with an arts organization committed to help build and serve the surrounding community. Four years after arriving in Connecticut, I was presented with the once-in-a-lifetime chance to work with a vibrant symphony committed to playing an important role in that process.

I am so pleased that the HSO is finding exciting ways to engage youth and reach out to new audiences, but this is just the beginning.

HN: So many of the HSO staff members are musicians or passionate about music. Are you a musician and/or is music a passion in your life?

RS: Music is embedded in my DNA. My grandmother played piano for silent movies, my greatuncle was a concert pianist and music was always present. The house resonated with *Peter and The Wolf, Carmen, Sleeping Beauty* and *The Nutcracker*. As a young child, I attended symphony performances and, being a New Yorker, those memories include Bernstein's Young People's Concerts. Classical music was my first love.

I began piano at age 5, studied music continuously through college and still play today. I wanted to be a concert pianist, but quickly recognized that my aspirations outstripped my talent! But my hopes became reality for my two children who are professional musicians.

HN: Hartford is becoming well known for its artistic flare and culture. Have you always lived here? If not, what other cities have you lived in and what did you enjoy about those locations?

RS: When I moved to the Hartford area four years ago, I had no idea of the level of art I could find here. In fact, I initially believed I'd have to return to New York to find great theater and a high level of music performance. I am the first to admit how wrong I was. Hartford is rightfully proud of its vibrant and creative arts environment. Hartford's investment in arts is manifested in many ways, from the Riverfront music series in the summer, the Hartford Jazz Festival in July to Open Studios Hartford every November. As Hartford advances as a center for the arts, the HSO will continue as one of its crown jewels.

HN: Having joined the HSO team after the launch of the Bushnell/HSO alliance, what exciting opportunities do you think will come from this dynamic alliance?

RS: I am thrilled to be part of an exciting and innovative experiment with the goal of finding new ways to help buttress important arts organizations. With administrative "back office" assistance from the Bushnell, the HSO has been 'liberated' to focus on the music, the artistic programming, and creative expansion of our outreach.

And because of the Bushnell's support, we are now working to engage more individuals, businesses and other community members as key financial partners.

Helping the HSO cultivate new economic partners ensures that the HSO will not merely survive but flourish. Each donor should take pride in every note the symphony plays, for without them, the music – and the HSO – would be silenced.

HN: You only started working here a few days ago, but what can you tell us about the impressions so far of the HSO and its current staff members?

RS: In just a few days, every musician or staff member I've met has made me feel instantly welcomed and valued. Their deep dedication, love and passion for the symphony is palpable, and never before have I felt so "at home" so fast. To my delight, our donors echo these strong passions, making it apparent that every individual connected with the HSO is committed to our success.

Focus on Discovery Series

The Hartford Symphony Orchestra Education department presented its first concert in the Lincoln Financial Discovery Series of the season on October 29: 5,000 Years in 50 Minutes: Celebrating Hispanic Culture in the USA through Music. Guest conductor Oscar Bustillo led students on an interactive musical journey featuring Caribbean Salsa, Tango, Copland and Bernstein, too. Hundreds of school children shouting out "Mambo!" at the direction of the conductor was a sight to see and hear! There was clapping, dancing in the seats, and even spontaneous group singing during the final number. It was yet another demonstration of this season's theme, Music Brings Us Together.
